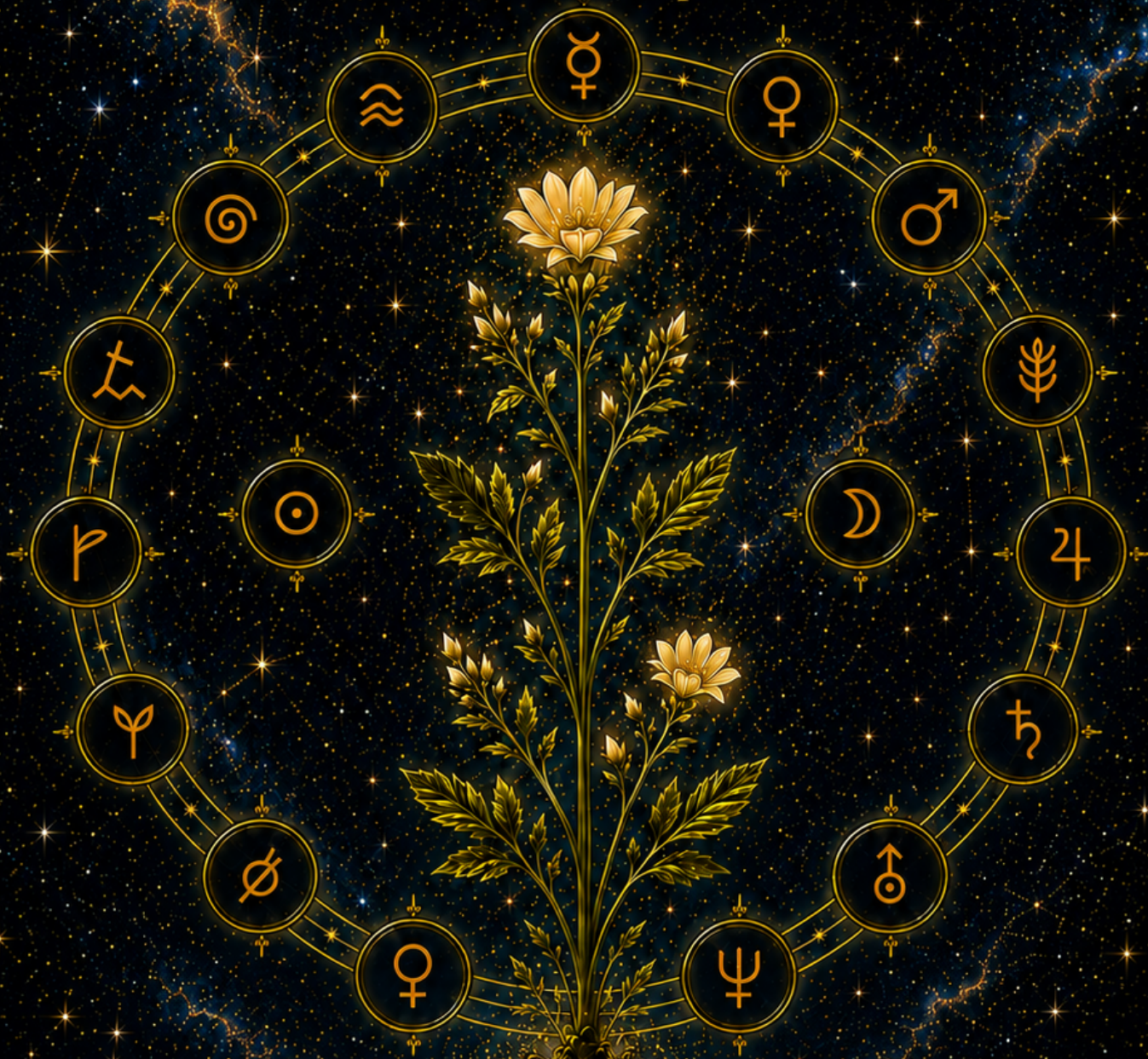

About This Sample

What you are holding is a free taste of *The Celestial Herbalist* — a two-volume guide to aligning an herb to the seventeen celestial bodies, drawing a precise, named use from every one.

On the pages that follow you will find, first, the heart of the system — what celestial alignment is and why an aligned herb is worth more than the plain plant — and then one complete herb, **Rosemary**, exactly as it appears in Volume Two: its portrait, all seventeen of its alignments, its correspondences, and its workings at a glance.

One herb of fifty. If a single plant holds this much, imagine the whole sky.

What Is Celestial Herbalism?

Celestial herbalism is the practice of aligning an herb to a celestial body to focus one facet of the herb's energy and put it to use. That is the whole of it in a sentence; the rest of this section says what it means, why it works, and why it is worth doing.

The practice joins two kinds of knowledge that grew up apart. One is the lore of herbs — the long record of the energy they offer. The other is astrology — the equally long record of what each celestial body influences. Each is ancient, and each stands on its own; but neither, alone, can do what the two do together, which is to use the influence of a celestial body to draw a single facet of an herb's energy into focus.

As Above, So Below

Why should a body unthinkably far away have anything to do with a leaf in your hand? The answer is the oldest principle in this tradition, and it fits in four words: “as above, so below.” The forces that move through the heavens run through the Earth as well, so that the natures above are echoed in the green world below. Older herbalism matched each plant to a single ruling planet and stopped there. Celestial herbalism expands that doctrine: a plant echoes not one celestial body but all of them — and why would it not? All the heavens shine on the Earth.

How this principle is built into a working art is the story the next section tells. Here it is enough to hold the principle itself — that the green world and the wider sky are bound in

likeness, and that celestial herbalism is the practice of working that likeness on purpose, through alignment.

The Herb Is the Constant; the Heavens Are the Prism

The process of alignment is simple: use the influence of a planet to focus the energy of an herb. The herb does not change. Every herb keeps its own nature: the rose is the flower of love and grief whether you align it or not. All alignment does is single out one of the facets the herb already holds, and leave the others untouched. Which one it singles out depends on the celestial body the herb is aligned to; what that facet is — its whole particular character — comes from the herb.

To help clarify this, consider a prism. It splits white light into its component colors. So if you need red light, you do not use white light, even though red is in it; you find a way to get the red by itself. In celestial herbalism we use the influences of the planets, like a prism, to separate out the component energies of an herb and focus them.



The Precision That Results

What does that focusing buy? A use that is exact where the common herbal use is vague. For example, let's align a few herbs to Mars. Align basil to Mars and it gives determined drive and the nerve to act in the teeth of fear, not "bravery" in general. Align the red rose to Mars and it gives a love that defends itself and will not be taken advantage of, not just "love." Align rosemary, and it raises a shield and strikes decisively; align garlic, and it drives out curse, contagion, and harm. One body, Mars, draws a different facet from each of the four — and any other body does the same.

Now align those same four herbs to Venus, the planet of love, and each gives a love of its own kind: basil gives faithful love, a lover's undivided attention; the red rose draws love near, deepens it, or rekindles one gone cold; rosemary gives a loyal, clear-eyed love that keeps its boundaries; and garlic drives envy and the evil eye out of a bond. Four herbs again, four results again — and where Mars drew from each what it holds of force, Venus draws what it holds of love. Which kind of result you get depends on the body; what that result actually is comes from the herb.

In this series we use the influence of seventeen celestial bodies — the Sun, the Moon, the planets, and the dwarf planets — to focus and separate out the specific energies within each herb, drawing seventeen distinct, named uses from every one.

What an Aligned Herb Is Worth

So why go to the trouble — why split out one facet when the whole herb holds them all? In the whole herb the facets are mixed, and the one you need comes through only watered down, lost among the sixteen you do not — the way red is lost in white light. Ask white light for red and you get white. Alignment gives you the red: that one facet, clear and at full strength, where the whole plant offered it only muddled into the rest. For any single purpose the unaligned herb is the weaker thing, its one useful facet diluted by everything around it; align it, and you lose nothing — you gain the one facet you came for.

And you get it exactly. A plain herb is blunt where an aligned one is sharp: reach for plain rose "for love" and you are only hoping, taking whatever shade of love the plant happens to give; reach for it aligned to Saturn and what you get is precise — a love made to last. Aligned to the Moon, a love that eases grief; aligned to Mars, a love that can defend itself. The plain herb answers your need roughly; the aligned herb answers it to the point — a working that lands, not one that drifts.

Now, why seventeen? Yes, every celestial body influences the herbs. But if we limit our work to those nearby, in our own solar system, the practice stays workable — and besides, being the closest, they are the most influential. So the seventeen bodies of our solar system are sufficient: all we need.

With this, each herb can be focused into seventeen distinct facets — and a single volume of fifty herbs into hundreds of separate workings. Whatever the moment asks for — a love made to last, the nerve to act in the teeth of fear, a harm driven out at the root — there is an aligned herbal energy for that need. You can prepare it yourself or obtain it ready-aligned. That is the worth of celestial herbalism — of any herb you bring to it, not only those set out in these volumes: not one flat use per plant, each herb blurring into the next, but a precise answer, with the force of the whole sky behind it, for the one thing you actually mean to do.



ROSEMARY

→ Celestial Aligned Herb ←

Salvia rosmarinus (formerly *Rosmarinus officinalis*)

The same sprig goes into the bride's bouquet and onto the coffin. Rosemary is carried at weddings and thrown into graves, woven into the happiest day and the saddest, and it is no contradiction — for both are acts of remembrance, and remembrance is what rosemary is for. "There's rosemary, that's for remembrance," says poor mad Ophelia, and she only says aloud what the herb had meant for two thousand years before her and has meant ever since: this is the plant that does not forget, and will not let you.

It is a tough, resinous, evergreen shrub of the Mediterranean rock and shore, its leaves like little dark needles, silvered beneath, its flowers a pale clear blue, its scent — sharp, piney, faintly camphorous — carrying a long way on a warm wind. The Romans gave it a sea-born name, *ros marinus*, the dew of the sea, for the way it grows on the dry cliffs above the surf and seems to drink the salt mist; and a Christian legend overlaid an older blue, telling that the flowers were white until the Virgin spread her cloak upon a rosemary bush in flight to Egypt, and that they took her color and have kept it since.

The memory it keeps is literal as well as sentimental. Greek scholars wound rosemary through their hair while they studied, trusting it to fix their reading in the mind for the examination, and the herb has carried that reputation ever since — the bright, sharp scent that wakes a drowsy attention and holds a thing fast in the mind once it is there. Rosemary is clarity made green: it clears a foggy head and sharpens the wandering thought to a point. So it serves the living student and the grieving mourner by one and the same power — keeping what matters from slipping away.

Its governing oracle turns that faithfulness toward peace. Rosemary answers to the sixth hexagram of the I Ching, *Resolving Conflict* — seek the compromise, choose harmony over confrontation, and mend the quarrel before it hardens past mending. Rosemary is an herb of fidelity and accord, sworn into marriages as a living pledge that love will remember its vows, planted by the door to keep a household whole and at peace. An old saying held that where rosemary flourished the woman of the house held the power — and more than one uneasy husband, the story goes, tore the bush out by the roots to prove the proverb wrong.

It belongs to the Mansion of the Waves, whose spirit is Amphitrite, queen of the sea — a pairing written into the herb's own sea-dew name. Its angels favor fortune and hidden wisdom: Poiel, greatly loved and a bringer of good fortune; Nith-Haiah, an angel of magic and quiet knowledge; and Ieiazal, ruler of the mid-October days under Libra. Those born on February 3, March 30, April 22, June 29, August 3, September 8, September 21, and October 14 carry rosemary as a birth herb. Its clear blue flower and clarifying nature answer

to the third eye, the seat of insight and steady memory, under the bright governance of the Sun.

It has earned its long keeping as an herb of cleansing and protection. Burned, it purifies a close or heavy room as readily as any incense, and history took that seriously: rosemary was strewn and smoldered against the plague, and it is the backbone of the legendary Four Thieves' Vinegar said to have carried grave-robbers safely through the Black Death. Distilled, it became Hungary Water, by tradition the first alcohol-based perfume in Europe, a rosemary cordial credited in legend with restoring an aged queen's youth and her beauty both. Its bright scent lifts a low, foggy spirit and wakes a tired mind, the clarifying breath of the sea-cliff herb. Only its concentrated oil asks for caution — best left alone in pregnancy and by those prone to seizures — for so potent an oil is not to be used in excess.

The two great rites it serves are worth seeing in their old detail, for they are the same gesture turned to opposite ends. At a wedding the sprigs were gilded, dipped in scented water, and bound with ribbon to be given to each guest, a token that the love being made that day would be faithfully remembered; at a burial the mourners carried rosemary to the graveside and cast it down upon the coffin before the earth went in, so that the one being left would not be forgotten by those who walked away. To carry rosemary, either day, was to promise to remember. And the herb has earned a quieter modern keeping few suspect: its preserving oils are now drawn off and used to keep fats and foods from going rancid, the keeper of memory turned keeper of freshness, holding off decay in the larder as it once held off forgetting in the heart.

Burned, grown, or taken, its deepest office is the simplest and most human: to hold the thread between what is here and what is gone, so that the bride remembers her vow and the mourner remembers the face, and nothing loved is ever quite let go of. Dew of the sea, and keeper of memory — the herb that remembers on our behalf.

Rosemary's Energy Across the Celestial Sphere

Here are the seventeen ways rosemary expresses its clarifying, decisive, remembering nature when aligned with each celestial body. In every alignment rosemary's sharp clarity is the constant — the planet decides what it sharpens.

1. Sun Aligned Rosemary — Radiant Confidence and Personal Power

Among the sun-ruled herbs, rosemary is the one that *claims its place* — Leo-bright and Fire-natured, working through the Solar Plexus to turn warmth into standing. The Sun

draws out that radiant facet most fully: it amplifies confidence and the courage to claim your place, magnetizes success, and fills your whole aura with bright, sustaining optimism. Where chamomile's solar gift is a *steady inner glow* and St. John's Wort's is *leadership of others*, rosemary's is *magnetic self-assertion* — stepping forward and claiming what is yours. Reach for it before a performance, or whenever you must shine and take your rightful place.

The Claimed Place. Wear a sprig of Sun-aligned rosemary as you step forward: *"I claim my place; I shine and am seen."*

2. Mercury Aligned Rosemary — Memory, Eloquence, and Mental Mastery

This is rosemary at its most characteristic: the herb of memory and the sharp mind, worn by scholars at examinations and burned by students, the very emblem of recall and clear thought. Mercury, ruler of the mind, draws out that facet fully: it accelerates learning and retention, brings clarity to complex problems, and lends eloquence to your speaking and writing. This is the herb for when mind and memory must be at their best. Reach for it for study and exams, for retention, and for articulate speech and writing.

The Scholar's Sprig. Carry or wear Mercury-aligned rosemary before study or speaking: *"My memory is sharp; my words come clear."*

3. Venus Aligned Rosemary — Loyal Love and Faithful Devotion

Rosemary is sacred to Aphrodite and woven into wedding rites, carried by bride and groom for love and loyalty and used to dispel jealousy. Venus draws out that facet: it strengthens fidelity and devotion in a partnership, dispels the jealousy that poisons a bond, and — with rosemary's clarifying nature — draws love that keeps clear boundaries and self-respect. This is love made loyal and clear-eyed. Reach for it to strengthen faithfulness, dispel jealousy, or call a love that is both devoted and honest.

The Faithful Knot. Tie Venus-aligned rosemary where you and your love rest: *"Loyal and clear, our love holds true."*

4. Moon Aligned Rosemary — Emotional Cleansing and Dream Recall

Rosemary cleanses the aura as it cleanses a room, and placed under the pillow it sharpens dream recall while warding nightmares. The Moon draws out that facet: it purifies the aura of psychic debris, supports emotional release and renewal, and sharpens the memory of your dreams while keeping nightmares away. This is rosemary's clarity turned to the

emotional and dreaming self. Reach for it to clear your aura, move through an emotional release, or remember your dreams vividly.

The Clearing Pass. Pass Moon-aligned rosemary smoke around yourself before bed: “*My aura is clean; my dreams, remembered.*”

5. Mars Aligned Rosemary — Courageous Protection and Decisive Action

Rosemary is a fierce protector against negativity and psychic attack, and under Mars that protective fire joins decisive, strategic action. Mars draws out that facet: it strengthens the shield against ill-will, kindles the courage to face fears, and powers the decisive move that prevails over obstacles. Where sage’s protection is *wise endurance* — standing firm and outlasting an attack — rosemary’s is the *active strike*: the psychic shield raised and the decisive move made. Reach for it for protection against psychic attack, courage in confrontation, and decisive action toward a goal.

The Raised Shield. Burn Mars-aligned rosemary at your door against ill-will: “*My guard is up; I act, and I prevail.*”

6. Ceres Aligned Rosemary — Teaching and Sharing What You Know

Rosemary’s clarity, under Ceres, becomes the gift of the teacher: knowledge passed on generously and clearly, in service to others’ learning. Ceres, the nurturer, draws out that facet: it helps you share what you know without arrogance, brings clear-minded patience to teaching, mentoring, and caregiving, and lets your knowledge become genuinely useful to those you guide. Among Ceres’s nurturing herbs, rosemary’s gift is *the clear mind in service* — nurturing others by helping them understand. Reach for it to teach, mentor, or bring a patient, clear mind to caregiving.

The Open Hand. Hold Ceres-aligned rosemary before you teach: “*I give what I know clearly and freely.*”

7. Jupiter Aligned Rosemary — Far-Sighted Judgment and the Widening View

Rosemary’s lucid clarity, under Jupiter, lifts to take in the wider field. Jupiter, planet of the wide horizon, draws out that facet: it widens your view from the immediate to the long horizon, helps you plan a growth with foresight, and keeps the larger strategy clear in mind. Among the herbs of wisdom, rosemary’s gift is the *far-sighted plan* — distinct from sage’s deeper wisdom about what is worth pursuing: rosemary sees clearly *how* to grow

and where the horizon lies. Reach for it to plan an expansion wisely or take the long-range view.

The Long View. Burn Jupiter-aligned rosemary while you plan: *“I see past the moment to the far horizon.”*

8. Saturn Aligned Rosemary — Disciplined Focus and Resilient Clarity

Rosemary’s talismans serve discipline, diligence, and order, and its clarity, grounded by Saturn, becomes unwavering long-term focus. Saturn draws out that facet: it strengthens the mental discipline for long work, the structural thinking for complex projects, and the resilient clarity that does not waver under sustained pressure. This is rosemary’s sharp mind made steady for the long haul. Reach for it for disciplined study, structured thinking on complex work, and stability through a long, demanding effort.

The Steady Mind. Keep Saturn-aligned rosemary at your desk through long work: *“My focus holds; I do not waver.”*

9. Uranus Aligned Rosemary — Original Thinking and the Inventive Solution

Rosemary’s talismans serve genius, innovation, and original thought. Uranus draws out that facet: applied to a hard, well-defined problem, its sharp mind invents the original answer that step-by-step thinking never reaches — not merely seeing a truth but *making* a novel solution. Among the innovators, rosemary’s gift is invention by *intellect* — the genius leap of reasoning that builds an answer no one had. Reach for it to originate something new by force of mind, where ordinary reasoning falls short.

The Inventor’s Spark. Hold Uranus-aligned rosemary over a hard problem: *“I reason past the obvious; the new answer is mine.”*

10. Neptune Aligned Rosemary — Lucid Intuition and Clear Psychic Sight

Through the third eye, rosemary opens intuition and psychic perception, yet uniquely it keeps you clear and grounded where many mystical herbs bring confusion. Neptune draws out that facet: it heightens psychic clarity for divination, deepens meditation while keeping awareness lucid, and lets you explore higher realms without losing your footing. Where oak grounds mysticism in *deep roots*, rosemary grounds it in *mental lucidity* — the rare herb that opens the veil yet keeps the mind clear and the experience remembered. Reach for it for psychic openness without losing clarity.

The Clear Veil. Burn Neptune-aligned rosemary before divination: “*I open the sight and keep my mind clear.*”

11. Pluto Aligned Rosemary — Deep Purification and Past-Life Recall

Rosemary is the great cleanser, and under Pluto its purifying power reaches root-level; burned in meditation, it opens the memory of past lives. Pluto draws out that facet: it clears deep, entrenched negativity and ancestral patterns, supports karmic and shadow work, and — through rosemary’s gift of remembrance — opens the recall of past lives. Where comfrey heals *this* life’s buried trauma and sage opens past-life *sight* through uncrossing, rosemary’s gift is *recall* — memory reaching back across lifetimes to remember what was. Reach for it for past-life recall and deep, root-level purification.

The Root Cleansing. Burn Pluto-aligned rosemary in meditation: “*I clear what is buried; I remember what was.*”

12. Eris Aligned Rosemary — The Lucid Mind Free of Consensus

Rosemary lends clarity of thought, and turned toward the outsider’s vantage it becomes the lucid, independent mind. Eris, free of the group’s agreed beliefs, draws out that facet: it frees your thinking from what everyone else assumes, lets you reason a question on its own merits rather than the crowd’s, and keeps your reasoning sharp and your own under pressure to fall in line. Among the herbs that stand apart, rosemary’s gift is the *lucid reasoning* of independence — distinct from sage’s seasoned judgment, the clear active thinking that owes nothing to consensus. Reach for it to think a question through free of groupthink.

The Own Reasoning. Carry Eris-aligned rosemary when the crowd presses: “*I reason for myself; my mind is my own.*”

13. Haumea Aligned Rosemary — Clear-Sighted Bringing-Forth

Rosemary lends clarity, and joined to creation it brings the new into being with a clear eye. Haumea, goddess of childbirth, draws out that facet: it sees clearly what is being born, attends its emergence with a steady and lucid mind, and ensures the new thing arrives whole and well-formed rather than in a blur. Note the difference from rosemary’s Makemake alignment, where its clarity ignites the *idea*; here that same clarity attends the

birth of new life, the lucid mind that brings something forth knowing exactly what it is. Reach for it to bring the new into being knowingly and well.

The Lucid Midwife. Hold Haumea-aligned rosemary as something is born: *“I bring this forth clearly, whole and well.”*

14. Makemake Aligned Rosemary — Creative Clarity and Inspired Beginnings

Rosemary’s talismans serve innovation and fresh starts, and its clarity, under Makemake, fuels creative projects with both inspiration and focus. Makemake draws out that facet: it brings clear vision to artistic projects, sparks inspired new ideas, and joins the focus to execute with the spark to innovate. Reach for it at the launch of a creative venture that needs both imagination and a sharp, organized mind.

The Bright Start. Burn Makemake-aligned rosemary at a project’s launch: *“Clear vision, sharp focus — I begin.”*

15. Gonggong Aligned Rosemary — Clarity and Stability in Chaos

Rosemary’s clarity and protection become a stabilizing force when life turns chaotic. Gonggong, whose flood would sweep all things away, draws out that facet: it preserves sharp thinking and sound judgment when your usual structures collapse, so you can see the situation accurately and decide well in the thick of disorder. Where sage *accepts* the chaos and oak *endures* it, rosemary *thinks clearly through* it — the lucid head that does not get swept up in the panic around it. Reach for it when chaos threatens to scramble your thinking.

The Clear Head. Hold Gonggong-aligned rosemary amid disorder: *“Around me, chaos; within me, a clear head.”*

16. Quaoar Aligned Rosemary — Self-Acceptance Through Clear Self-Knowledge

Through the Heart chakra of self-love, rosemary’s clarity becomes the confident, peaceful awareness of seeing yourself truly. Quaoar, whose harmony is found within, draws out that facet: it reinforces self-assurance rooted in genuine self-knowledge, brings inner peace joined to mental clarity, and helps you see yourself truthfully and make peace with what you see. Where comfrey heals the wound and sage accepts the circumstance, rosemary’s gift is *clear self-knowledge* — the peace that comes from seeing yourself accurately rather than through distortion. Reach for it for confidence rooted in honest self-knowledge.

The True Mirror. Anoint yourself with a rubbed sprig of Quaoar-aligned rosemary: “*I see myself clearly, and I am at peace.*”

17. Sedna Aligned Rosemary — Resilient Clarity Through Deep Transformation

Rosemary’s healing clarity, under Sedna, sustains you through the longest transformations: clear thinking that does not destabilize even as you process deep change. Sedna draws out that facet: it lets you process deep, difficult emotion — grief, betrayal, loss — without your mind flooding or shutting down, keeping thought clear and steady even as feeling runs deep. Where spearmint reconnects you with *why* you endure, rosemary keeps the *mind clear while the heart works* — the lucidity that lets you process rather than drown. Reach for it when deep feeling must not cost you your clarity.

The Steady Lucid. Keep Sedna-aligned rosemary by you through deep change: “*I feel it fully and still think clear.*”

The herb of remembrance never changes; what changes is what it sharpens. A single clarifying, decisive herb, attuned to seventeen frequencies, ready to sharpen, cleanse, protect, and move you to action exactly where it is needed most.

Everyday Magic with Celestial Rosemary

Five fuller workings using your aligned rosemary, none repeating the gestures above.

The Four Thieves’ Wash (Mars + Pluto). In the old protective-cleansing way, steep rosemary in vinegar and water and wipe down your doorframes, then your own hands and the back of your neck, working room to room to drive out staleness and ill-will: “*Staleness and harm, I wipe you away; this house and this body are clean.*”

The Remembrance Sprig (Mercury + Moon). To honor a memory or a beloved dead, lay a sprig of rosemary where you will see it, speak the name aloud, and keep one beneath your pillow to meet them in dreams: “*Rosemary for remembrance; you are not forgotten.*”

The Scholar’s Burning (Mercury). Before a long study stretch, burn a little rosemary at your desk and keep a sprig in your pocket; whenever focus flags, crush the sprig and breathe it: “*My mind comes back, sharp and clear.*”

The Loyal-Love Wreath (Venus). Weave rosemary into a small wreath or sachet for the bedroom to strengthen fidelity and dispel jealousy, refreshing it at each new moon: *“Faithful and clear, our love holds; no jealousy takes root here.”*

The Aura Bath (Moon + Sun). Steep rosemary into a warm bath to strip away psychic debris and restore your bright standing, stepping out renewed: *“Cleansed and clear, I rise and shine again.”*

17. **Sedna Aligned Rosemary** — Holds clarity through deep transformation
